From The Team

Ministry

June, for some people, will mean 'exams'. Think of those who will be sitting exams and pray for them in the coming weeks.

In 1905, Elwood Cubberly, who later became the Dean of Education at Stanford, wrote: 'Schools should be factories in which raw products, children, are to be shaped and formed into finished products... the specifications for manufacturing will come from government and industry.'

It is interesting to read what someone thought 100 years ago - perhaps things haven't changed very much. It is certainly wise to equip and prepare young people for 'the marketplace' but isn't education more than that?

One of the windows in St Mary's Church in Kirkby Lonsdale shows a collection of parables – the parable of the sower, the parable of the talents and the growing seed. Seeds planted in the ground, things growing and harvest time are all common themes in the stories that Jesus told.

'The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field. But... his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat... The servants asked him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' 'No,' he answered.... 'let both grow together until the harvest.' (Matthew 13:24-30)

The disciples asked Jesus what this parable meant, and he replied: 'The field is the world, and the good seed stands for the people of the kingdom. The weeds are the people of the evil one... The harvest is the end of the age' (Matthew 13:38-39).

Somebody like Elwood Cubberly, might read the parable of the weeds and wheat as a story about passing or failing exams after growing up through the education system! But that wouldn't fit with many of the other things that Jesus said. The Gospels offer a rather different perspective on education to that of Elwood Cubberly. They explore 'discipleship' which is about being trained in a way of life rather than being shaped to fit a particular economic system. There is a great deal about growth and transformation; the effect that our lives have on those around us; the way that we might influence the world towards God's kingdom, even though it is sometimes a very mixed up world where good and evil seem to live side by side. The story of the talents invites us to think about how we can use whatever things God has entrusted to the greatest benefit. The story of the sower invites to think about how we allow good things to take root, grow and bear fruit in our lives.

So, what should education be for? Answer in no more than 1000 words.'

Bowling Club Open Day

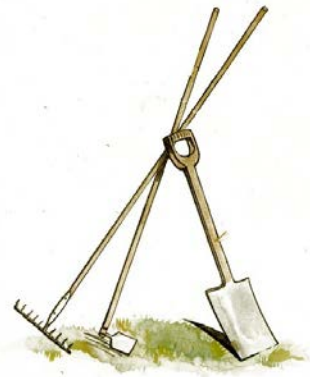

(LADFAS) Report: Tuesday 19th May 2016

“Threads of Feeling – The London Foundling Hospital’s 18th Century Textile Tokens”

Professor Styles gave an extremely moving lecture on the London’s first foundling hospital – actually the first in England. London was the largest and wealthiest and most beautiful city in Europe (according to some), and was expanding rapidly. There was a constant influx of people from the country, and for many, who were ill or destitute, there was no safety net. In Continental Catholic Europe there had always been foundling hospitals, but with the Reformation these had been abolished in favour of the “Poor Law”. The institutions that cared for the sick, the destitute and foundling – the nunneries - had been abolished by Henry VIII. The poor Law was administered by the parishes, and either by bad management or by just too many calls on too little money, the law was failing.

Captain Thomas Coram, on returning to London, was appalled to see the number of unwanted, sick and dying children there were all over the city. To help to alleviate this awful state of affairs he decided to build a foundling hospital. It took him eleven years to get the hospital started. This was accomplished with the help of very high profile members of the public, the popular press and new attitudes to the needy and destitute. Queen Caroline was a contributor. She had come from Halle - as did the composer Handel - where there had been one of the most prominent hospitals on the continent. Handel wrote his “Messiah” for the hospital, and it was performed every year of his life, contributing enormous amounts of money to the cause.

Mothers, who were successful in getting their babies accepted (to begin with most were turned away) were asked to leave a token to identify the child. Most tokens were scraps of cloth from old pieces of material used in wrapping their babies. These tokens were attached to a “Billet” which gave information about the child and could be used to identify the child if they were to be reunited with the parent. Very few were! The majority of scraps had printed hearts and were made of Indian cotton, very up-to-date for those times. One token was a thin strip of patch-work. The mother later came to retrieve her child with a matching piece. It had been cut down the middle.

The hospital was very successful, even by today’s standards. The children were treated with best medical care available for the times and were treated well. They all had good foster homes and if the homes were not good, were removed. They were apprenticed to useful trades and many did well by the standards of the time. Because private contributions were not sufficient to cater for the needs of the city, the government took over the project and then, no baby was ever turned away. It was a wonderful endeavour and was made possible by some of the most talented and memorable people of the time, including Handel and Hogarth. They with Thomas Coram himself, never had any children themselves!

This will be the LADFAS AGM and lectures will start promptly at **1.45 pm** not at 2.15. There will be no lectures until **Tuesday September 20th** when Gillian Hovell *BA* will give a lecture entitled “**Roman Britain Unearthed – What the Romans really did for Art**”. Then, lectures will start again promptly at **2.15pm**.

What are Julian Meetings?

A Julian Meeting is a group of people who meet together regularly to take part in a time of silent prayer. The meetings are for people of all denominations - in fact it is a requirement that they should be ecumenical. They take their inspiration from the example and writings of the Lady Julian of Norwich, a 14th century mystic who spent much of her life in solitude and prayer. There are Julian Meetings held in many places throughout the country but there is no national network and little administrative organisation. Individual meetings arrange their own affairs – the only requirement being that the main content of a meeting will be a period of silent contemplative prayer.

There is a Julian Meeting held in Kirkby Lonsdale – on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 2.15pm in the Presbytery at St. Joseph's R.C. church. We start with a short reading followed by a few minutes of music which leads us into silence – and music leads us out of the silence after about 30 minutes. We finish with a cup of tea which is an opportunity for a more social time. There is no leader but members take it in turn to choose an introductory reading and music – however there is no pressure on anyone to do this.

On Thursday 5th May the Rotary Club of Lunesdale held its 41st Charter Evening celebration dinner at the Bentham Golf Club. It was attended by 90 people which included Rotary Club members their partners, families and friends. We were delighted to welcome also

1190 District Governor Arthur Jones, District International Chair Derek Timms and fellow Rotarians from 8 other Rotary Clubs. Guests enjoyed an excellent meal, an address by President John Dale an address by the District Governor and were entertained by the popular well known entertainer Norman Price.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the International Recognition Award by Arthur Jones to Rotarian Duncan Hamlett of the Lunesdale Club and to Rotarian Peter Doughty of the Kirkham & Rural Fylde Club. Last year, owing to the persistent and determined efforts of both of these Rotarians, 15 Under Six Centres, part of the Mary's Meals Charity in Malawi, were awarded an International Global Grant of £79,000. 29 Rotary Clubs, mainly in District 1190, made financial contributions to this, the biggest project ever undertaken by the District. This grant will ensure numerous improvements to 9 of these centres and complete fitting out of 6 new build Centres for nursery age children. Initially 3,000 toddlers and many more in future years will benefit from a daily meal, a start on the education highway plus trained helpers in nursery care all of which is aimed at giving them a better start in life.

On Thursday 12th May club members plus family and friends visited The Wensleydale Creamery at Hawes. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed an excellent meal followed by a fascinating cheese-making demonstration. No visit to the Creamery is complete however without a visit to the temperature controlled cheese shop. The selection of cheeses to taste and buy is quite an experience and many purchases were made. Everyone agreed it was a really pleasant visit.

Barbon Strollers

The Barbon Strollers, led by Robert Welsh, left Hornby taking the track through the farm alongside the river Wenning. At the bend of the river a fine view of Hornby Castle was enjoyed. We then passed through a gate and bearing left to the next stile linking several fields. We walked across the former railway opened in 1850 to link the West Riding towns with Morecambe, the line was closed to passenger traffic in 1966. Proceeding ahead with the Hindburn river on our left we entered the Main Street of Wray. The Scarecrow Festival entertained us as we proceeded over the river Roeburn to the Bridge Cafe and Garden Centre. Ollie Burrow, who is also the gym manager at Kirkby Lonsdale RUFC, trained a team of 12 for the event, which saw them take on 31 obstacles across a gruelling 5km course in Caton.

Ollie said: "After training hard since January, we as a team decided to sign up to the Badass Mucker challenge. Sport Relief was also taking place at the time and we all agreed we'd love to raise money for it. In the run-up to the event, I lead three weekly bootcamp classes, as well as personal training sessions, to help everyone feel more confident in their fitness so they could do their best in the challenge."

He added: "Unfortunately, the conditions on the day were abysmal. We were released in the tail-end of the waves, so the course had become a mushy mess, which meant tackling each obstacle was much more difficult. However, we stayed together as a team all the way around the course and we all had a great laugh doing so.

"The hardest parts of the challenge were probably the high-climbing obstacles, as well as those that were in enclosed spaces. Some of our group members were a bit claustrophobic and others were afraid of heights, but we all pulled together as a team and took our time to encourage them through each step to climb and each inch to crawl – helping them overcome their fears. I remember those parts of the course very clearly, as it showed how close we had all become through the tough bootcamp sessions leading up to the event."

Ollie added: "When we finished the course, we felt a huge sense of achievement throughout the team and everyone was really proud of themselves to see how far they'd physically come since starting training.

"The Badass Mucker was our first big challenge and we have plans to take part in a 10km in the future. On behalf of myself and all the team members, we would like to say a massive thank you to everyone who kindly donated and also to the local businesses that gave so generously and helped us raise £830 for Sport Relief!" Can you claim Carer's Allowance?

If you are caring for someone with a long-term illness or disability and you have had to reduce or give up work, financial support may be available for you both. What is available will depend on your circumstances.

The person who is ill may be eligible for Personal Independence Payments (PIP) to help with their daily living and mobility costs. Their eligibility will be assessed on how their condition affects them, and what support they need. To apply for PIP, you can call the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) and then complete the form you are sent.

If the person you care for receives the component of PIP which covers living costs (as opposed to mobility costs), then you may be able to claim Carer's Allowance. You need to earn £110 a week or less from your job after tax, and care for the person for 35 hours a week, to be eligible. You can make an application on the gov.uk website.

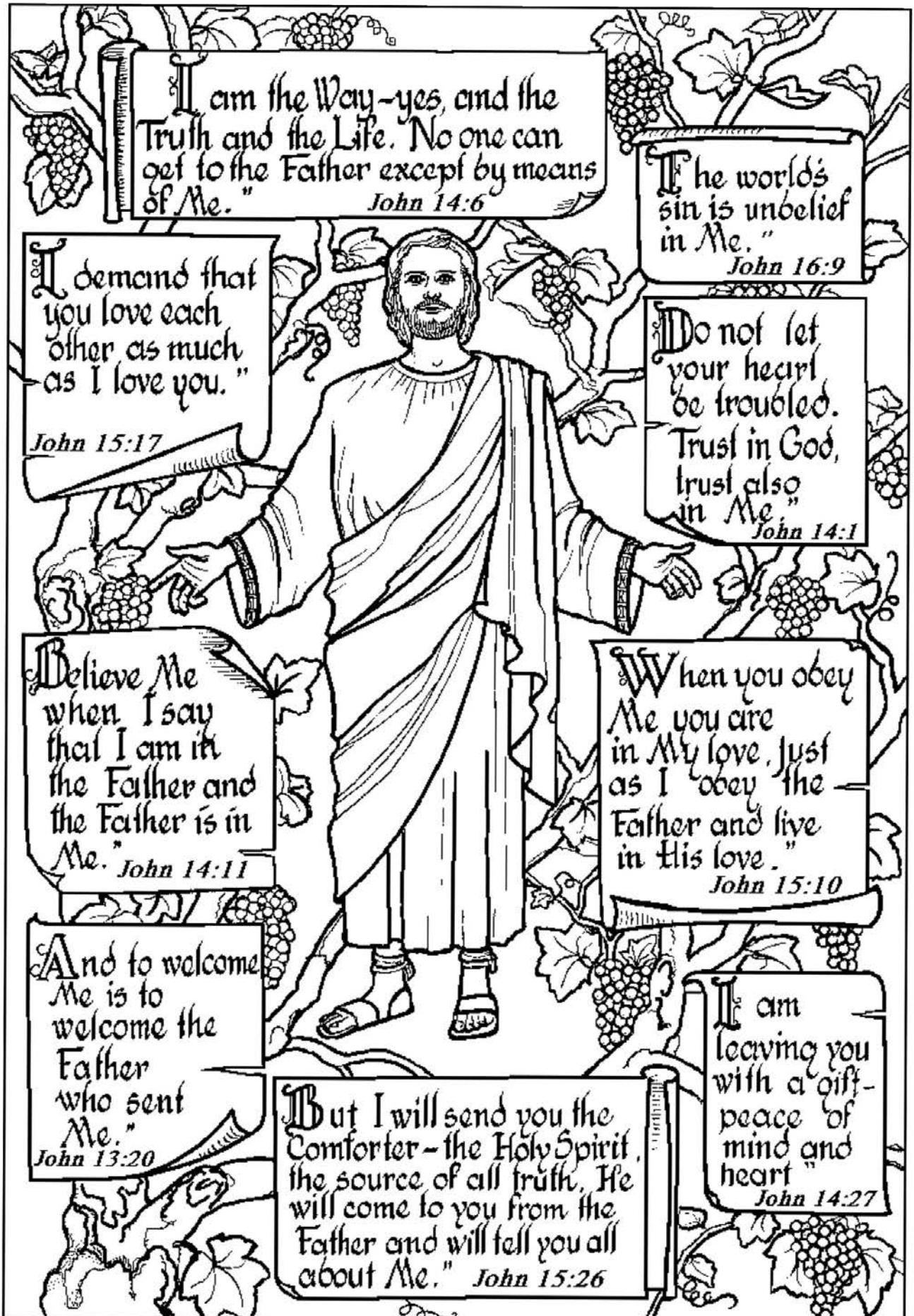
