That's Not Pun-ny!

What is a dentist's favourite hymn? 'Crown him with many crowns'

I quite like puns. My family don't always appreciate my attempts at pun-humour, however. I came across an item about some building work that is being carried out at St John's and King's Park church in Dalkeith near Edinburgh. Soon after the building work started, the church put up a banner because the minister felt that the large 'Danger! Keep out!' sign on the front door was sending out the wrong message.

The banner that they put up reads:
"Church is not closed! We are undergoing a faith lift,"

It appeals to my sense of humour and, it seems, it has appealed to a few other people as well because it has gone viral. The minister of the church wryly observed how temporarily closing the church had managed to raise its profile.

The impression that the media gives is that the Church and Christianity are in terminal decline – in this country at least. In fact there is evidence that the church in Britain is growing and people are recognising that there are many things that churches do that aren't captured in statistics.

On 21st April HM The Queen will celebrate her 90th birthday. In a new book 'The Servant Queen and the King She Serves' the Queen writes of her enduring Christian faith and shares a treasured memory of the moment George VI prayed for the nation during the Second World War in 1939. She quotes the verses he read out as he addressed his people in that year's Christmas broadcast: 'I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year, "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown". 'And he replied, "Go out into the darkness, and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light, and safer than a known way".'

(The lines come from The Gate Of The Year, by Minnie Louise Haskins, a poet and LSE academic)

The poem is so treasured by the Royal Family that its lines are inscribed at the entrance to the George VI memorial chapel in Windsor. It was also read at the Queen Mother's funeral in 2002.

The Queen also offers her thanks for the nation's prayers for her during her 64 years on the throne. She writes: 'I have been – and remain – very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for His steadfast love. I have indeed seen His faithfulness.'

'Lost in Blue' by Debs Newbold

The audience at Fraser Hall in Cowan Bridge on the 11th March had a fascinating and enriching evening as Debs Newbold, in her one woman show, used music, sound and visual imagery to create the scene in our minds of a family travelling to meet up at their old family home after 15 years. She then completely engaged us, imaginatively telling us of the history behind the present relationships with David that his daughter, his sister and his wife have developed over the last 15 years. David is in a coma after an accident. We watch as his daughter comes to know her father and the struggles she faces confronted by her Mother's and Aunt's fixed behaviours and beliefs. Opposite the family lives an observant pigeon fancier nerd who challenges the fixed attitudes of the family as he cares and loves his pigeons, reflecting on their freedom, their homing instincts and how they continue to be loved and special though no longer able to fly.

Despite addressing such traumatic experiences and feelings, the evening was an engaging, uplifting and exciting experience. The potential creativity of humans facing the impossible emerged in the humour; the challenges of growing up and facing reality were finally confronted; the potential of art to express emotion, enable one to move on from the past and find a way forward emerged. We were invited to question and wonder what is happening in the mind and brain of David while he is comatose. This is story telling lifted to a new level by the talented Debs Newbold, demonstrating the potential of the medium to enable our fundamental narratives to change. Thank you to Spot On rural touring. (LADFAS) Report: Tuesday 15th March 2016

“The Impressionists and the Painting of Modern Life”

Ms Lois Oliver gave an intelligent and thought provoking lecture on the subjects that the impressionists chose to paint, many of these ideas which this writer had never ever considered before! In 1845 Baudelaire had written “No one had thought to paint the heroism of modern life that surrounds us.” Painters trained in the Paris Schools had, up to this time, chosen biblical subjects and subjects from battles and heroic incidents from times past on which to exercise their talents.

From 1851 to 1861 the population of Paris had exploded from 1000000 to 2000000 and people in that city were choosing to live their lives very much outside the house and on the streets and cafés of the city. It was these scenes and the interaction between the people involved in these scenes that the great impressionists chose to explore – in accordance with Baudelaire’s directive.

The painting “Un Bar aux Folies-Bergere” by Manet, documents this life, but it is full of ambiguities and odd perspectives. Is the lady behind the bar from the twilight world of the demi-mondaine. Is the lady a prostitute or merely a bar-maid! And does the man in the top-hat intend to proposition her? Just behind the two main characters can just be seen the high wire act and the audience watching the trapeze artist. The picture gives a feel of immediacy, but was in fact fished – as with all his other pictures – in the Studio.

“The Umbrellas” by Renois is a picture of two time frames, and these periods can be exactly delineated by the ladies fashion. The first half was his impressionist period in 1844. Ms. Oliver cleverly showed fashion prints to exactly date the dresses. The second half was painted in 1881, and here again she showed us the relevant fashion prints. Renois, whose father was a tailor, had faithfully and accurately copied the styles. At this time Renois had dispensed with impressionism.

Degas, who had been classically educated in the best art schools in Paris, was expected to represent classical and biblical subjects. Instead he chose to paint the ballet and the performing arts, just as Baudelaire had required¹ But all these great paintings are seen through the eyes of men! No women could boldly go where these had gone – except perhaps someone as advanced as George Sand.

However, the highlight of the lecture for me was the introduction of a female artist who had been the inspiration for Manet’s impressionism! Mary Cassatt, chose to represent many of the subjects that Manet painted, albeit within a setting where she was permitted to be – the theatre, the bourgeois enjoyment of the park, and many aspects of the home. She was a prolific painter and painted many very beautiful pictures. However, almost all of her work is in America, and here in England we will not be able to see them at first hand.

The next talks will be Tuesday 19th April when Deborah Lambert *BA* will give a talk entitled “English Furniture in the 18th Century – The Golden Age”, and Tuesday 17th May when John Styles *MA* will give a talk entitled “Threads of Feeling – The London Foundling Hospital’s 18th Century Textile Tokens”. The venue is Borwick and Priest Hutton Memorial Hall. All lectures start promptly at 2.15 pm.

An Afternoon Concert by GLEDHOLT MALE VOICE CHOIR

In 1948 a group of men belonging to Gledholt Methodist Church formed a double quartet under the leadership of Joe Ripley to sing at local churches, old peoples' homes etc. Gradually the double quartet expanded to become, first the Gledholt Glee Singers, next the Ripley Singers and, finally, Gledholt Male Voice Choir.

The choir has been based in Lindley, Huddersfield for more than 30 years. Lindley is home, besides Gledholt Male Voice

A CELEBRATION of some of the area's small cheese makers is being held in May

Country Harvest, near Ingleton, is holding a cheese and wine evening on May 19 to help promote local cheese makers and encourage people to explore the fantastic food made on their doorstep. The cheeses include one made by a young farming couple who are diversifying into the world of cheese making for the first time; others are by more established makers with decades of experience behind them. For some it will be the first chance to try cheeses like Fellstone, a Wensleydale-style cheese made by Clare and Tom Noblet at their 250-acre upland hill farm Whin Yeats in Hutton Roof. The couple, both 30, only started producing the cheese - which has a fresh flavour and is matured for two months wrapped in cloth and butter - from their 80-strong herd of Holstein Friesians last autumn. Now they have just started selling small batches through Country Harvest. Other cheeses on offer at the tasting in May include one produced by Ribblesdale, a small artisan producer based in Hawes which specialises in goats cheese; the milk is sourced from a single herd of goats in Lancashire and used to create cheeses on their Yorkshire farm. Sykes Fell Ewes Milk cheese, handmade by the Procter family in Goosnargh, will also be on offer at the event, alongside a Blue Swaledale, rich from cows' milk with a natural rind, crafted in Richmond, North Yorkshire. The five cheeses will all be accompanied by wines selected by Chris Leather from Stainton Wines in Kendal. Chris will host the evening and discuss each of the wines in turn and why they should be paired with that particular cheese.

Country Harvest's Food Hall manager Richard Simmonds said: "Country Harvest is in such a great location where the Dales meet the Lakes and on the cusp of Lancashire too so we've chosen cheeses from all three counties. We've got a long association with a lot of these cheese makers and we're also really excited to be the only seller of Fellstone cheese in Yorkshire – it really couldn't be more local to us as Clare Noblet's parents are our next door neighbours at Country Harvest! We think we've put together a really interesting night for fans of good food and those who like things made from local producers...we've included one cheese from much further afield though as we thought it would be a real challenge for Chris! With his encyclopaedic knowledge of wine I'm sure he'll be fine though and that we're all going to learn plenty of things too."

Tickets for the event which runs from 7pm-8.30pm on May 19 cost £10 and are available from Country Harvest on the A65 at Ingleton. Stainton Wines is the main stockists of wine at Country Harvest, a combined food emporium, coffee shop and gift hall..

Councillor's Corner

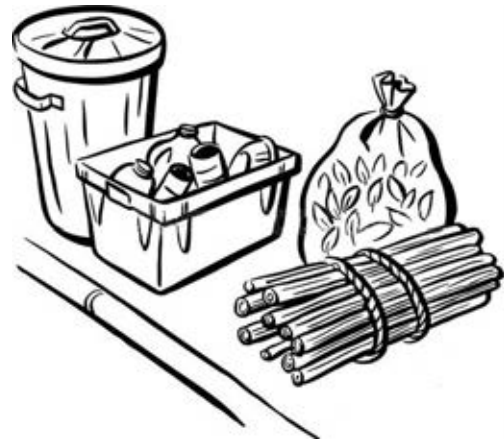

On what felt like the first proper day of spring, 20 volunteers gathered in the warm sunshine in mid-March to clear up around Devil's Bridge and the Riverside Path. The first party arrived at 7.00 AM and set off up the A683 to Casterton, at a time on a Sunday morning when there is next to no traffic. The A683 has now been cleared all the way from Devil's Bridge to the Head pub at Middleton. A big thanks to all those people prepared to do volunteer work at a time on Sunday mornings when most people are still in bed.

Later that morning the main band of volunteers arrived to fan out in all directions. Some cleared litter down by the Lune between the bridges and in the two picnic areas either side of the river, others were collecting wood debris brought down by the storms in November and December and burning this on bonfires to prevent it being carried downstream in the next big flood, potentially causing damage to structures such as bridges. Others still were scouring the beaches and riverbank areas north to Radical Steps, filling up their black bags with plastic debris caught in the trees.

Finally we should mention our volunteer willow planters. The willow that was planted in 2013 and has 'taken' has done an excellent job in holding the banks in place against the ravages of floods. The plants have grown vigorously and need cutting back to promote growth and stop them becoming too tall. The benefit of cutting willow back at this time of year is that the offshoots can be replanted straight back into the ground to strengthen the bank where it looks most vulnerable. Cut into sticks a couple of feet long and pushed into soil, the ends of the sticks start rooting by themselves and binding the soil together.

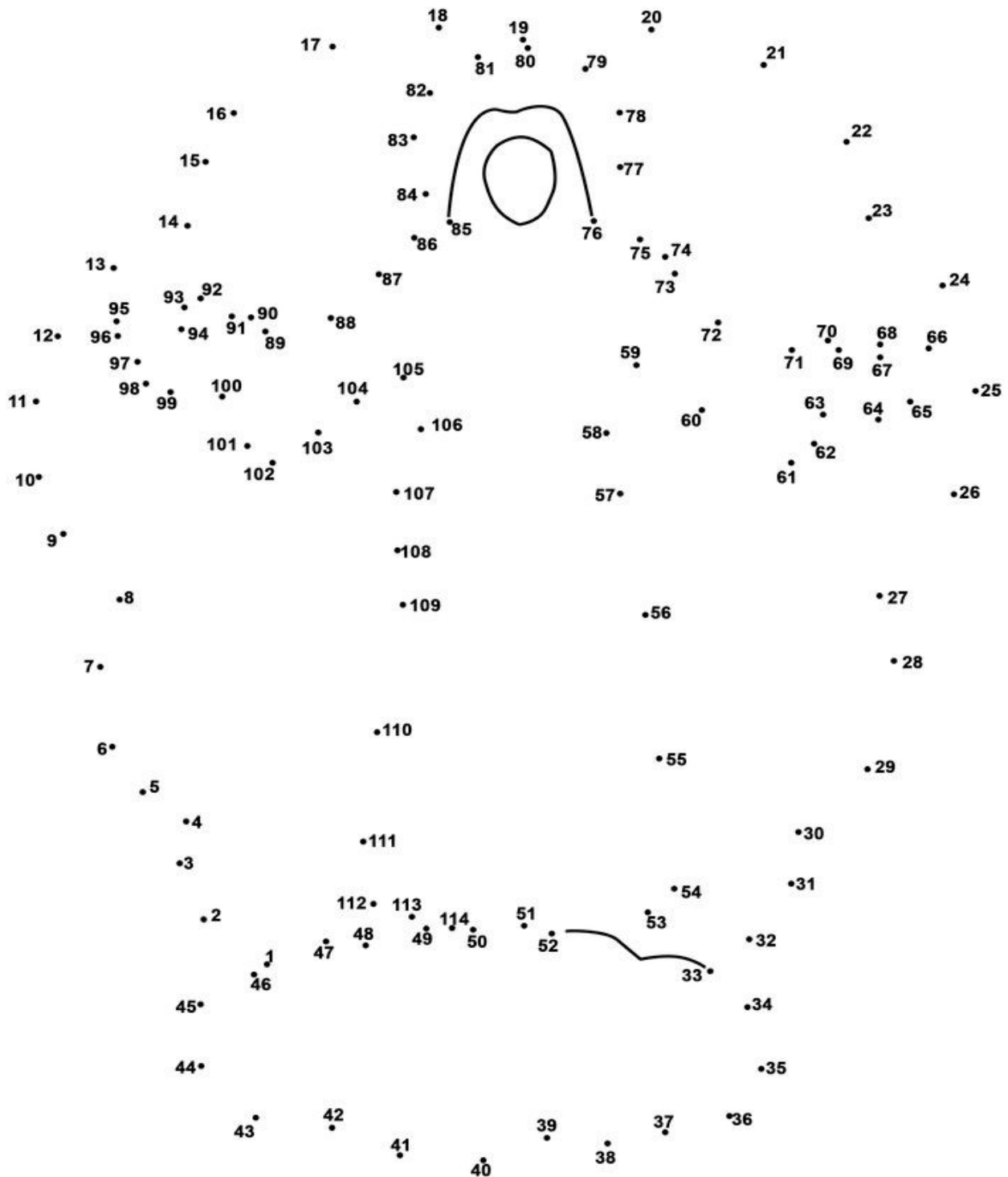
So, many thanks to all of you who came to help - your efforts will be appreciated by all who walk along the Riverside Path and visit Devil's Bridge.

It's been a busy year for many. The proposals for the 80-homes development north of Kendal Road - perhaps better described as opposite Harling Bank - are hardening up and consultation with local people has begun.

Queen Elizabeth School is not standing still. The Chamber of Trade is supporting their proposal to create a new studio school, teaching specialist skills which will benefit the local community.

Market Square has had a power upgrade so the site is now a more attractive venue for traders coming to our weekly Charter market. It means that refrigerator vehicles and hot food purveyors will have access to the power they need - and lighting will feature when the darker nights return later in the year.

It's encouraging to hear that residents - and businesses - are buying into the MyKL loyalty card. This benefits shops and shoppers alike. 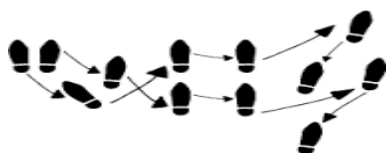

Fibre broadband is now available to over 1,200 Cumbrian properties on the Kirkby Lonsdale exchange, with the addition of a cabinet in Casterton at the end of 2015. The cabinet was delivered by the Connecting Cumbria partnership and is the sixth in the area with five already live in and around Kirkby Lonsdale.

Whilst one in four residents are already benefiting from significantly improved broadband speeds, many are yet to upgrade their service. It is important to note that the upgrade to speed that residents can expect does not happen automatically. Residents must contact an Internet Service Provider (ISP) to upgrade their package and arrange for an engineer to visit the property. While many will assume this costs much more than a standard broadband package, we have spoken to several residents and businesses that have actually saved money by upgrading due to not reviewing their package in some time.
